授業の概要／Course outline	<p>This course introduces the history of East Asian traditional thoughts, which will lead to deeper and better insights into the contemporary issues of the region.</p> <p>The course will consist of four sections.</p> <p>1. Firstly, it will focus on the major schools of Chinese classical philosophy (such as Confucianism, Taoism and Legalism) that formed a common ideological background in premodern East Asia, tracing how they had been generated and developed into highly sophisticated theories (both metaphysical and practical), and how they had spread over a broad area of the Far East and fostered the emergence of a "sphere of civilization".</p> <p>2. In the second section, the course will discuss the formation and development of the "Three Teachings", an aggregate of Confucianism, Taoism and Sinicized Buddhism, as the dominant ideology of East Asian dynasties after the Han Empire. The profound influence of these teachings (particularly the Neo-Confucian thoughts which had been organized from the 11th century) to the traditional sociopolitical and economic systems will be also surveyed. The cases of Japan and Korea as well as "China Proper" will be considered comparatively.</p> <p>3. The third section will provide a brief overview of the various forms of literal religion in different parts of East Asia, which were ingenerated as the above teachings had been gradually merged with indigenous folk beliefs or later imported religions. The cases of Chinese folk religions, Shintoism in Japan, "Japanese versions" of Sinicized Buddhism, and Islam in China will be particularly focused on.</p> <p>4. Then finally, the problems of "traditional thoughts and modernity" in East Asia will be discussed. This final section will deal with the philosophical struggles in China and Japan after the late 19th century to reconsider the traditional thoughts, construct the new ways of thinking, and reshape the classical philosophies as parts of the "invented" national traditions.</p> <p>The latter two parts will include once or twice very short field trips.</p>		
到達目標／Learning objectives	<p>Students are expected to acquire basic knowledge about the topics above and have an elementary understanding of the whole picture of East Asian traditional thoughts, which would also leads to deeper and better insights into many contemporary issues of the region.</p> <p>The course will be comprised of (1) "general lecture" and (2) "student presentations based on assigned readings". Student presentations will be set up in the latter half of the semester. A specific schedule of the presentations will be prepared by the 3rd week of the semester.</p> <p>Participation of students will be required in both parts.</p>
